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## NOTICE OF APPEAL

**TO:** The Registrar  
Environment Court  
**WELLINGTON**

### **Appellant**

1. First Gas Limited (**First Gas**) appeals against parts of the decisions of the Greater Wellington Regional Council (**Council**) on the Proposed Natural Resources Plan for the Wellington Region (**Proposed Plan**).
2. First Gas is the successor of Vector Gas Limited<sup>1</sup>. Vector Gas Limited made a submission and further submission on the Proposed Plan.

### **Decision**

3. First Gas received notice of the decision on 31 July 2019 (**Decision**).
4. The Decision was made by an independent hearings panel on behalf of the Wellington Regional Council.

### **Trade Competitor**

5. First Gas is not a trade competitor for the purposes of section 308D of the Act.

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<sup>1</sup> First Gas purchased the gas transmission network from Vector Gas Ltd on 20 April 2016 and is now the owner and operator of the gas transmission network. First Gas is Vector Gas Limited's successor and has also been confirmed as a Requiring Authority.

### **Part of decision on appeal**

6. The parts of the Decision that First Gas is appealing are:
  - 6.1 Chapter 2: Definitions (Regionally Significant Infrastructure);
  - 6.2 Chapter 4: Policies; and
  - 6.3 Chapter 5: Rules.

### **Reasons for the appeal**

7. The reasons for the appeal are as follows:
  - 7.1 The Decision:
    - 7.1.1 does not promote the sustainable management of natural and physical resources, and is therefore contrary to Part 2 of the Act;
    - 7.1.2 does not result in the most appropriate plan provisions to achieve the Proposed Plan's objectives;
    - 7.1.3 does not implement the Council's functions under section 30 of the RMA;
    - 7.1.4 does not give effect to higher order planning documents under section 67 of the RMA; and
    - 7.1.5 is contrary to good resource management practice.
8. Without limiting the generality of the reasons outlined above, First Gas also appeals the Decision for the following specific reasons:
  - 8.1 The Proposed Plan fails to:

- 8.1.1 properly provide for regionally significant infrastructure of a linear nature which has unique functional needs and operational requirements; and
  - 8.1.2 provide a planning framework whereby a case by case assessment of regionally significant infrastructure can be undertaken, including positive effects and benefits.
- 8.2 The Proposed Plan does not give effect to the Regional Policy Statement (“RPS”).
- 8.2.1 The RPS contains enabling and protective provisions for Regionally Significant Infrastructure<sup>2</sup>. Objective 10 requires that the social, economic, cultural and environmental, benefits of regionally significant infrastructure are recognised and protected. Policy 7 directs regional plans to include policies and methods that recognise the social, economic, cultural and environmental benefits of regionally significant infrastructure.
  - 8.2.2 The explanation to Policy 7 states:

*“Renewable energy generation and regionally significant infrastructure can also have adverse effects on the surrounding environment and community. These competing considerations need to be weighed on a case by case basis to determine what is appropriate in the circumstances.”*
  - 8.2.3 The Decision fails to properly recognise and protect the social, economic, cultural and environmental benefits of regionally significant infrastructure, and in particular the gas transmission network.

8.2.4 The gas transmission network transmits gas to the Wellington Region for distribution<sup>3</sup> and has a critical role in providing for the Region's social, cultural and economic well-being, as well as its health and safety. The gas transmission network in its entirety is regionally significant infrastructure. It is comprised of both above and below ground infrastructure to transmit and ultimately supply gas to the Region, including pipelines and associated fittings, appurtenances, fixtures and equipment required for the conveyance of the product or material in the pipelines and/or for its safe, efficient and effective operation.

8.3 The additional specific reasons as set out in the Table in **Attachment A** to this notice.

## **Relief**

9. First Gas seeks the following relief:

9.1 Amendments to the Proposed Plan as set out in **Attachment A** (or relief with the same or similar effect);

9.2 Further or consequential relief as may be necessary to address the matters raised in First Gas' appeal and submissions; and

9.3 Costs.
